### **Subject: Please Vote NO on SB26-097**

Dear Senator, I am your constituent, and I respectfully ask you to vote NO on SB26-097, the bill to decriminalize adult commercial sexual activity.

As your constituent and a Coloradan deeply committed to the safety and dignity of women, children, and vulnerable people in our state, I urge you to vote NO on SB26-097, the bill to decriminalize adult commercial sexual activity.

The evidence on this issue is sobering. Extensive international research — along with domestic data from states like Nevada, where prostitution is partially legal — reveals a consistent pattern: legalization expands demand, emboldens traffickers, and makes it far harder for law enforcement to distinguish consensual transactions from coercion. Where the commercial sex market grows, so does exploitation, particularly among vulnerable women and minors who have few other options.

Colorado has an opportunity — and an obligation — to lead differently. Becoming the first state in the nation to fully legalize prostitution would not be progress; it would be a signal that the commodification of human beings is something our state is willing to normalize.

I respectfully ask you to stand with women, children, families, and communities across Colorado by voting NO on SB26-097.
